President's Message

The momentum and enthusiasm we experience in SUUF has inspired the SUUF board to transition SUUF into a year-round fellowship! We know that SUUF services fill spiritual, emotional, and social needs which do not stop because it's summer, and that *providing community is a huge part of our mission*. The expansion of Sunday services will bring SUUF to the level of service of all other churches in Sedona and of all other UU churches in the UU Southwest Region which includes CO, AZ, and NM.

With 79 members, we're big enough and strong enough (also creative enough) to serve our people year-round. We are blessed to be a Fellowship with a minister who says, "Yes, we can!" to new ideas, and with a board and congregants who also echo, "Yes, we can!" We've tried and succeeded with many new endeavors in the past few years and have become more vibrant and connected because of all of our "Yesses"! We have embraced novelty...and ideas...and trying things...all with good planning and without fear!

A quote from our Joe Wine: Actually, my high each week is the association with friends and fellow seekers at our SUUF meetings. This group represents family for me. I am blessed by their love and respect, and usually come away with a new angle on truth and understanding. Joe is not an outlier with those sentiments. SUUF is important to our people.

It's been said that our part-time people affect attendance and their absence in the summer would be a deterrent to holding summer services. Here's this term's attendance data which indicate that return of part-timers had no impact (other than that we *dearly love having them with us!*).

- The Sept 3, 2023 service had 75 people in attendance (no part-timers).
- Monthly Attendance Averages this term: Sept-67 (no part-timers), Oct-59, Nov- 63, Dec-69, Jan-67, 1st 3 Sundays in Feb-78 (BTW, in the fall of 2022, we averaged in the 40s!)

UU policy is that ministers get a month of vacation and a month of study and provide 10 months of services with a Sunday off each month. As noted, all UUs in our SW Region continue to hold creative services during those two remaining months. Rev. Anthony will speak through June, then unique July and August services will be created and offered at the synagogue by a newly forming Summer Team. The services may include panels, talks by Sedona heroes, group discussions, speakers from within our fellowship and from the area. Rest assured, the Summer Team is excited to start creating interesting services for you. Stay tuned!

Some will attend SUUF regularly in the summer; some will not. A good thing about UUs is that we practice free choice; we attend services as we wish. We acknowledge the value of SUUF in our lives and the lives of our friends as we commune with others in our beloved community.

We expect:

- Much of our format will remain the same as what we now enjoy.
- We will use music available through UUA and from our talented congregants.
- We plan to use the synagogue TV to project our Order of Service, lyric projection and music videos. Nate says he's on-board with sound and technology! Yay Nate!
- Descriptions of upcoming services will be *within* Paul's (free) articles in the Red Rock News and emailed in SUUF updates.
- Collections will continue to be taken and deposited.

The enthusiasm and vitality of our Sunday morning gatherings are palpable and contagious. All who wish to keep that energy moving through the summer will continue to gather, greet one another and, as Rev. Anthony says, get "inspiration for daily living". May it be so. Blessings, Tanya





Board Meeting Recap

Board Meeting Recap - Friday, February 16, 2024, 1:00 PM, regular meeting, via ZOOM

Presiding officer: Tanya Mayer. Present: Anthony, Tanya, Gary, Lee, Helen, Barb, and Liz. Anthony gave the Opening Words. Tanya call the meeting to order at 1:14 PM after check-in by attendees. A Quorum was met. January minutes approved as amended.

Minister's Report – Anthony provided highlights of his monthly activities and noted that SUUF will use the facilities at Church of the Red Rocks for the "How to Talk About Race" discussions.

President's Report – Tanya summarized her monthly activities, noting the enthusiastic response of 45 people at service on Feb. 4th for the Mission and Vision statements update.

Treasurer's Report – Gary reviewed an in-depth report on several key items with motions made to approve: (1) engagement letter for the Bookkeeping Firm, Red Rock Accounting Group, who acquired Sterling Financial. (2) a Financial Statement Review in accordance to the bylaws. (3) Reinvestment of current CD's. (4) Obtaining and using a PO BOX for SUUF mailing address. All motions were seconded and all in favor.

Auction Update – Liz Herrell noted that ticket sales through SUUF, Susannah, and at-the-door should make for a successful event and that the food and decorations are being completed.

Unfinished Business -

- 1. SUUF Security Plan Board was presented with and discussed an extensive 12-page plan to present to JCSVV. Gary noted the document is good with minor modifications needed. There was a motion to approve, seconded, and all in favor.
- 2. Projection of date of Audio Recording of Services on YouTube and Website: it was noted that JCSVV is having some cable issues and a projected date is not yet available.
- 3. Council of Chairs Initial meeting March 24th after Fellowship Anthony stated that the leaders of teams and committees shall meet to share their work and ideas. Forming this Council will enable leadership to see the inner workings and the whole picture of SUUF.
- 4. Mission/Vision Update Tanya noted that sections of the task force will meet in West Sedona and VOC to read through all responses to the mission/vision questions. The total group of 13 will later meet with Chuck Spence to develop statements to reflect the input. Mission and vision statements will be voted on at the annual meeting in May.

New Business -

- 1. Summer Proposal Tanya presented an extensive plan and timeline to offer services in July and August of 2024, in addition to the board's March of 2023 approval of SUUF services with Rev. Anthony going through June, making SUUF a Year-Round Church, matching all churches in Sedona and all UU churches in our SW region. After discussion of costs and attendance, the Board approved the proposal, all in favor.
- 2. "Why I Use the Website" Tanya noted an awareness campaign in March.
- 3. Newsletter Article on Legacy Discussion regarding writing an article for March newsletter.
- 4. New Interest Group SUUF Outdoors Activities Discussion about fast-tracking board approval pending details on waivers and liabilities with insurance company.
- 5. August Leadership Retreat Tentative date set for 8/23 and 8/24 for the Board, with Members of Council of Chairs to be included this year.

Closing – Anthony said closing words. Meeting adjourned at 2:45 PM. Next Board Meeting – Friday, March 15, 2024 at 1:00 PM, via ZOOM. Submitted by Lee Klose

Community Outreach Committee

We had a good morning at Manzanita Outreach on February 22nd, cleaning, sorting, and packing bags of tomatoes for the food distribution. Thank you to our 11 volunteers who came out to help this amazing organization that supports so many in the Verde Valley who are food insecure.

Donations will be collected together with the Synagogue to support Old Town Mission throughout March. Old Town Mission provides breakfast, clothing, showers, and other support services for the homeless population in the Verde Valley. Sunscreen, flashlights with batteries (reasonable quality, i.e. not dollar store versions), hand/body wipes (packs of 25+) and new or gently used clean sleeping bags will be collected. A donation box is in the lobby all 5 Sundays in March for your donations. You can also give cash or checks to Old Town Mission to either Penny De Jarnette, Cora Shor or Mary McCaffrey before or after services.

SUUF helps with the Backpack program at the Sedona Food Bank on Thursdays in April and May. This requires 2 people each week to spend about an hour and a half packing the bags of food and delivering the bags to West Sedona Elementary School. This program provides food for children to eat over the weekend who have been identified as food insecure. A sign up will be in the lobby from mid-March.

SUUF and Me interviews of Cynthia "Sam" Kasbohm and Deidre Roen

Name: "Sam" Kasbohm



Where did you grow up? I was born in San Angelo, Texas, but have no memory of it. My father was in the Air Force and we moved quite frequently. I've lived in several states from coast to coast and also in Madrid, Spain when I was a teenager.

What was/is your career? I was a nurse in the Air Force stationed in Omaha, Nebraska which is where I met my husband who was also in the AF. After I left the AF I worked part-time at various hospitals until we moved to Arkansas. There I did community outreach and home health for 20 years.

When did you come to the Verde Valley and why? We first came to Sedona in 2008 on vacation and also looking into places to retire. We bought a house in 2010 and have been here since.

Are you involved with any volunteer activities you'd like to share? Shortly after we moved here I joined an organization called P.E.O., Philanthropic Educational Organization, that raises funds to provide very low-interest loans and scholarships to women who are interested in returning to school.

What is your religious background? Because of moving around so much growing up, I didn't have a strong religious connection. I raised my children in the Methodist church so they would have a spiritual foundation on which they could make their own decisions regarding church and faith as they grew up. I never really connected with the church. Then one day several years ago I was hiking with a man from UU and we started talking about church and faith. He asked about my beliefs and told me I was a UU. At the time nature was my church and I wasn't ready for a physical place of faith. But over time I began to want that fellowship and curiosity and sharing of beliefs. That is when I started coming to SUUF and appreciating the varied values and exploration into all faiths and connections to our individual spirituality.



Name Deidre Roen

Where did you grow up? I was raised in the semi-rural town of Anoka, MN.

What is/was your career? First I catalogued books for a library.

I taught 10th grade history. Then I worked for North Central which became Republic and Northwest Airlines which is now Delta Airlines. I held several positions: reservations, fares, scheduling, and CRC. I retired May 2002 after 23 years in the airline business.

When did you come to the Verde Valley and why? Sedona is a metaphysical and new age place. We made several trips to Sedona between 1987 to 2000 before moving to

Sedona in October 2002. We loved Sedona and the Verde Valley and were semi-retired.

Are you involved with any volunteer activities you'd like to share? I have always had an interest in music and theater. I used to sing in several choirs, served in community theater for 9 years, managed a Coffee House in the 1970's and helped run the In the Living Room Concert Series held at the Center for Positive Living in VOC. I support a couple of music artists in the Verde Valley area.

What is your religious background? I have been on a spiritual journey for a long time. I grew up attending the United Methodist Church of Anoka. I have since been involved in several Spiritual Communities, New Thought Theology at the Key to Life, Metaphysics on my own, Celtic Druidism, and the Center for Positive Living in the Village of Oak Creek practicing Science of Mind. Currently, I have established my own Spiritual Path combining Celtic Principles and the Science of Mind.

What brought you to SUUF? The Center for Positive Living closed. Tom, my husband, searched the internet for a New Thought church in the Verde Valley. He knew about C.U.U.P.S from the Midwest. We found the SUUF website. The seven principles are our principles. We attended a service led by Rev. Glenn Farley where everyone was welcoming, and it was a community of like-minded people.



Each year on March 31, we honor International Transgender Day of Visibility! We celebrate the joy and resilience of trans and non-binary people everywhere by elevating voices and experiences from these communities.

There are over 1.6 million trans youth (age 13+) and adults across the United States. We are parents and family members. We are your coworkers, your neighbors, and your friends. We are a diverse community, representing all racial and ethnic backgrounds as well as all faith traditions.

While we have made significant progress in recent years, with more visibility than ever before, we are still fighting for basic human rights for the community. Today we are experiencing significant political attacks by extremists legislating hate in the states and in Congress. We also face an ongoing epidemic of fatal violence, especially against Black and Brown trans women. Today and every day, we must celebrate all trans and non-binary people everywhere and combat disinformation, discrimination, and hate impacting our community.
