Upcoming Sunday Services

We meet in the sanctuary of the synagogue, 100 Meadowlark Dr., in Sedona on Sundays at 10:00.

September 1 "Water is Life" - We will explore the sacred and essential nature of water, not just as a physical resource but as a spiritual symbol that connects us to the Earth, each other, and the deeper currents of life. Join us as we celebrate the life-giving essence of water and renew our dedication to safeguarding this precious element for future generations.

September 8 "What's Going On?" - Inspired by Marvin Gaye's timeless song, "What's Going On," this service invites us to reflect on the pressing issues of our time through the lens of compassion, justice, and love. Join us as we ask the profound question, "What's going on?" and explore how we, as a community, can be part of the healing and transformation our world so desperately needs.

September 15 "Transcendentalism: An Invitation" - Transcendentalism invites us to explore the deeper connections between the self, nature, and the divine. Rooted in the 19th-century movement that influenced Unitarian Universalist thought, Transcendentalism encourages us to look within, trust our inner wisdom, and recognize the sacred in the world around us. Join us as we accept Transcendentalism's invitation to seek deeper meaning, cultivate a sense of wonder, and connect with the divine presence that transcends our everyday experiences.

September 22 "Choosing Good Trouble" - Guest Speaker, Dr. Joe Wegwert

Dr. Wegwert will present a sermon entitled "Choosing Good Trouble," that examines how Unitarian Universalists might draw on our Values and Principles to challenge the present currents of post-truth politics in American culture. This sermon will address these questions through a discussion of the concept of Truth, a consideration of our radical (and heretical) UU heritage, and the challenges of how our UU identities of (largely) whiteness, middle-classness, and niceness can do something.

September 29th "The Eternal Dance of Life: Lessons from Rumi" - The poetry of Rumi, a 13th-century Sufi mystic, offers timeless wisdom on the beauty, complexity, and interconnectedness of life. Join us as we explore the lessons Rumi offers on the eternal dance of life and how we can find meaning and connection in every step.

President's Message

Welcome back to Sedona Unitarian Universalist Fellowship services all you travelers, and to Rev. Anthony and Susannah who've had a respite as well! Our Dynamic SUUF Duo were on the dais through June, and were missed in July and August.

Despite their absence, we did have a wonderful, exploratory summer of services focusing on "Building Community." Our last newsletter was written at the end of May, so this column will catch you up on our first SUUF summer of services in case you were enjoying traveling or just sleeping in.

First some statistics: June had an average of 45 in attendance with 13 total visitors; July averaged 46 in attendance and August, 48. Our total guests for July and August was 55, which was wonderful and surprising. So many new people came through our doors to attend summer programs and to sample SUUF. Some will, no doubt, continue and become members of SUUF.

That's good news and interesting, but the real news was the Summer Team "Building Community" programs in July and August--the creative experimentation, the generosity, the inspiration and information shared, the inclusion of some new community populations, and the FUN!

Many summer services radiated community generosity:

- June 7, Teresa Beltan, one of our 5 Hispanic panelists and her friend, Karena, decorated our stage
 area and our table of refreshments and even prepared the drinks and treats! Our 5 panelists
 generously shared some heart-breaking as well as some joyous stories--allowing us a picture of their
 past and present lives.
- June 14, in a service on kindness in action, each attendee got a \$100 bill from an anonymous donor to pay kindness forward in any way of their choosing. Their actions were written on cards and shared in the August 25 service.
- June 21, Laurie Moore of Sedona Area Homeless Alliance (SAHA) gave us a glimpse of the lives and issues of the homeless in our area and was given \$865 for SAHA from the offertory.
- August 4, Dr. Maurice Crandall enlightened us about how to better honor the space we inhabit...
 Yavapai-Apache Sacred Space. The group of youth attending from the Yavapai-Apache Youth
 Council was given \$293 by the congregation for their community activities.
- August 11, Lin Ennis shared how trees effectively work together in community. To raise
 environmental consciousness about sparing life-giving trees, each person walked out the door with
 a roll of bamboo toilet paper in hand to try.
- August 25, people gathered for a service in which the concept of beloved community was explored. Many congregants shared their experiences of bonding in our community. The many ways people paid forward their \$100 gifts were shared. Canned or packaged food was collected for the Sedona Food Bank. A scrumptious potluck lunch followed. It was, indeed, a *Celebration of Community*!

So much love flowed in the programs noted above and in Donna Cavadon's "We're Better Together" talk and Linda Brefeld, Lou Ann Bruck, and Dev. Ross's "Heart-Centered Communication talk and activities.

Our Summer Services Team: J'net and Nate Smith, Lin Ennis, Linda Brefeld, Marj Haas, Deidre Roen, Diane Nadeau, Donna Cavadon, Paul Friedman, Ellie Cooper, Thomas and Lou Ann Bruck and I, worked well together, jumping in to help wherever and whenever it was needed. We appreciate the support and feedback from SUUF and from the greater Sedona community. We also appreciate having had the honor of creating and presenting eight summer SUUF services for this beloved community.

 sign up.



Nice Racism: How Progressive White People Perpetuate Racial Harm



Board, Team, and Committee Reports

Board Meeting Recap

The meeting was called to order on Zoom by President Tanya Mayer at 12:45 p.m., June 21, 2024, with Elizabeth Herrell, Barb Malat, Helen Knoll, Gary Stewart and Rev. Anthony attending. May minutes were approved.

Written reports were submitted by the minister, president and treasurer. Some highlights are as follows:

Minister's Report

Rev. Anthony conducted a special ceremony for new members and a memorial service for SUUF member Tony Marini. In addition to his regular duties, Rev. Anthony moderated a panel discussion regarding Juneteenth at the Sedona library, which was well attended and received.

President's Report

In addition to usual discussion group organizing and attending, she conducted the annual meeting May 19 and helped plan summer services. Along with the Finance Team, she and arranged special gatherings for major donors, who increased giving. She and Anthony interviewed and presented a contract to our newly approved administrative assistant, Priyanka David.

Treasurer's Report

Gini Kyle will send thank you notes to those who pledged for the coming year. The annual budget shows a projected deficit of approximately \$15,000. Thus far, at least one-half of members have pledged to increase their giving for the coming year. Unless total donations exceed current projections, however, either funds will have to be moved from reserves or expenses will have to be cut. New members in the coming year are likely to greatly affect the deficit. Bylaws require a review of SUUF's financial statement

Unfinished business

- 1. <u>Administrative assistant</u> —Has excellent credentials and has accepted the contract to work two days per week.
- 2. <u>JCSVV rental agreement</u>—The current contract proposal is for rent of \$236 per week with no use of the basement, and includes the possibility that JCSVV will need to use the sanctuary for memorial services on some Sunday mornings.
- 3. <u>Off-site insurance</u>--Church of the Red Rocks has offered the use of space for SUUF's board retreat. SUUF will continue to explore whether insurance is required.

New business

- 1. <u>Recording possibilities for SUUF services</u>—A number of possibilities for presenting services online were discussed, including the use of Zoom, YouTube, etc. A motion to table a decision carried. Nate Smith has already subscribed to Adobe video editing software. A motion was passed to pay the subscription not to exceed six months.,
- 2. <u>Music for July-August 2024</u>—Nate will play recorded music for SUUF summer services. A motion was passed to pay Nate \$50 per week for this work with the summer presenters and projection work.
- 3. <u>Minister's Evaluation</u>—Board members reviewed individual submissions to Rev. Anthony's evaluation and chose ratings for each category. Overall, board members were highly pleased with Rev. Anthony's performance and grateful for his contribution to the success of SUUF. A motion was made, seconded and approved to submit the completed evaluation to the appropriate recipients. Tanya will do so.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

Hope House is a transitional home in Sedona for up to three homeless mothers and their children. The mothers get support to find jobs, learn life skills and save enough money to enable them to move on into independent living situations.

Sedona Area Homeless Alliance Did you know?

There are approximately 500 homeless men, women and children who are experiencing homelessness in the Verde Valley and that is likely a low estimate. Out of that number about 200 of those people live on the streets of Sedona and breaks

down to about 15% children, 23% women & 62% men.

Sedona Area Homeless Alliance is serving clients ages 6 weeks to 82 at this time.

Many of the adults in the local homeless community work and about 1/2 of the children attend local school. Every community has a homeless sector and for more than 30 years that has included Sedona. In 2013 Arizona Panhandling laws changed and the sight of people on our corners asking for help led some people to falsely believe that was when homelessness began in Sedona.
