Minister's Message

Honoring National Native American Month

A Unitarian Universalist Call to Awareness and Respect



November is National Native American Heritage Month, a time to honor and reflect on the histories, cultures, and contributions of Indigenous peoples across what is now called North America. For Unitarian Universalists, this month is an invitation to deepen our commitment to justice, respect, and appreciation for Native communities who have endured and resisted centuries of displacement, erasure, and marginalization. As we honor Indigenous history, we also have the opportunity to seek right relationship, broaden our understanding, and ask what true solidarity can mean.

Unitarian Universalism calls us to "seek truth in love" and to grapple with historical truths that have often gone unspoken or overlooked. Colonial histories have traditionally celebrated narratives of "discovery" and "settlement" that omit the violent impacts of colonialism on Indigenous nations and people. National Native American Heritage Month calls us to confront these histories with courage, acknowledging the pain and resilience of Native peoples and considering the ethical implications for us as inheritors of these lands. In learning these truths, we open ourselves to a deeper understanding of the enduring legacy of colonization and our role in creating a more just and inclusive society.

For Indigenous peoples, culture is not only a heritage to be celebrated but also a lived, evolving reality. This month is an opportunity to learn about and support Indigenous cultural practices and rights, including the preservation of language, ceremony, and land stewardship. Unitarian Universalists have long held the principle of "respect for the interdependent web of all existence," which aligns with Indigenous worldviews that honor all beings, human and non-human, as interconnected. We can show respect by advocating for policies that uphold Indigenous rights to cultural sovereignty and support Indigenous-led conservation efforts to protect their ancestral lands.

As Unitarian Universalists, we celebrate National Native American Heritage Month as a time to reflect, honor, and to take action. May we deepen our awareness, strengthen our commitment to justice, and stand in solidarity with Native communities not only in November but all year round. We honor the enduring resilience and contributions of Indigenous peoples and commit ourselves to working toward a future of respect, equity, and shared humanity.

May this month remind us of the shared path toward a just and compassionate world, one in which we walk together in unity and respect.

PROGRESS ON SUUF'S COMMUNITY INTERFAITH ACTIVITIES:

SUUF is reaching out to other congregations to collaborate on various activities! Examples are:

- **Women of Courage Concert** in October brought SUUF and The Church of the Red Rocks congregations together. The \$900+ raised was given to Hope House and Verde Valley Sanctuary.

- **A Monthly Film Group**--meets on the 2nd Wednesdays at 10:30, at the Church of the Red Rocks. All SUUFers and CRR congregants are welcome (November's film description on p.7).
- **An Interfaith Forgiveness Workshop** will be held on Saturday, December 7, from 9-3:30, at the Sedona United Methodist Church.
- "Our Whole Lives" Interfaith Workshop (on sexuality) is planned for January in 2025.
- An "Aging Well" Interfaith Workshop with Bonnie Shimko will be held in 2025.

FUTURE INTERFAITH PROJECTS:

SUUF collaborates with Church of the Red Rocks and other faith groups to support the Hope House for homeless families with children in that established project. What else might be ours to do?

A Question to Ponder:

What community needs might we suggest that we and members of these faith communities and their allies in the Verde Valley collaborate to meet? How might we work together to promote justice, serve marginalized people, reduce climate change or...?

A Possibility to Consider:

For example, we believe in "the inherent worth and dignity of every person." This summer, we learned from Laurie Moore of the Sedona Area Housing Alliance (SAHA - more info on p. 14), that most homeless people here lack bathrooms, showers, a place to gather, and a place to sleep when it's cold outside, (unless donors contribute for hotel rooms). Imagine living without these necessities...how degrading! What if a few representatives from each faith community (and perhaps from the city and other organizations) gathered to study this problem and come up with ways we can contribute to meeting such needs? Is an interfaith action project like this worth a try?

Social Justice Interfaith Film Group



— A real treat is in for you in watching and discussing this month's film, Will and Harper. A discussion of the film will be held at Church of the Red Rocks, on Wednesday, November 13, led by Carolyn Kavanagh. Watch it on Netflix and come share your thoughts. It has a 99% critics review on rottentomatoes.com.

Will Ferrell was filming a movie when he received a most surprising email: his dear friend of nearly 30 years was coming out to him as a trans woman. That friend was Harper Steele, a writer he met on his first day at Saturday Night Live back in 1995. From that fateful first meeting in the halls of 30 Rock, Will knew he had found a match made in comedy, and their friendship and creative partnership would only continue to grow over the next 3 decades. In this intimate, honest, and heartfelt documentary, Will and Harper hit the open road together to process this new stage of their friendship and reintroduce Harper to the country that she loves -- this time, as herself. Over 16 days, the two drive from New York to LA, visiting stops that are

meaningful to them, to their friendship, and to America. Through laughter, tears, and many cans of Pringles, they push past their comfort zones as they re-examine their relationships to these spaces, and to each other, in this new light.

Board, Team, and Committee Reports

Board Meeting Recap

The regular monthly meeting of the Board was called to order by President Tanya Mayer at 2:00 P.M., October 18, 2024. Those present included Gary Stewart, Piya Jacob, Ben Shor, Donna Fox, Patty Delp, Mary McCaffrey, and Reverend Anthony Mtuaswa Johnson.

Written monthly reports had been submitted by the minister, president, secretary, and the treasurer. Discussion followed. Gary explained the "Employee Participation Agreement" that states an employee of SUUF may elect to contribute up to 10% of their income to the retirement fund and SUUF may designate a specific match to these contributions. Since no employee is currently contributing to this fund discussion followed that we could amend the document to show a 0% match at this time, and it can be amended again if and when an employee decides to contribute. Gary moved to amend the "Employee Participation Agreement" to reflect a 0% match. Tanya seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Mary moved to approve all monthly reports including the minutes of our September board meeting. Piya seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Old Business

Tanya informed us of the success of our summer services. Thanks to Tanya and a dedicated group of congregants, summer services not only brought in additional donations, but resulted in 5 new members (so far) and 55 new visitors to SUUF. Much discussion followed. Tanya moved to make SUUF services year around as the needs of our SUUF community and the greater community do not stop in the summer months. Gary seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Mary and Piya reminded us that they will oversee the Holiday Party this year. It will take place on Wednesday, December 18, at the HUB. Details to follow.

New Business

A By-law Committee was formed at the Leadership Retreat. The committee is made up of Debbie Losse, Mary McCaffrey and Gary Stewart. They will review SUUF's By-laws and report back to the board. Discussion followed regarding the creation of an ad hoc committee to investigate the possibility of sharing an existing building with another faith community or the possibility of buying our own. Tanya will inquire about interest within the Council of Chairs for this committee. Board members were also invited to join.

On November 3rd following services we will lead a Listening Circle to share results of the Leadership Retreat with the congregation and to hear responses. The retreat was held at the Church of the Red Rocks on October 4-5.

There was discussion on the potential use of Tiktoc and other social media platforms to spread the word about SUUF.

Gary pointed out the need to utilize the Google Drive with consistency. Pat Kopitke, Tanya, and Gary have graciously preformed this in the past, and now it can be passed on to Priyanka David. Tanya and Anthony will get Priyanka up and running with this.

Gary moved to adjourn the meeting. Seconded by Mary. Meeting adjourned at 4:00 P.M.

Leadership Retreat, Oct 4 - 5, 2024 Recap

The SUUF Leadership Retreat was held at the Church of the Red Rocks on October 4th and 5th 2024. Those in attendance during the two days included Reverend Anthony Mtuawsa Johnson, Tanya Mayer, Paul Friedman, Piya Jacob, Gary Stewart, Mary McCaffrey, Michael McCaffrey, Debby Losse, Donna Fox, Michael Steele, Pat Kopitke, J'net Smith, Cora Shor, Lydia Johnson, Barb Malat, George Lee, and Carolyn Kavanagh.

Friday evening began at 5:30 PM with information on the status of faith communities in the United States. The group then engaged in a Sharing Circle about experiences being introduced to and staying with SUUF. There was a sign up for Saturday's discussion groups. Meeting adjourned at 8:20 PM.

Saturday morning began at 9:00 AM. Tanya reviewed the results of the 2022 Leadership Retreat. The group broke into three discussion groups.

- 1. Board Succession and Bylaw Changes. Some ideas to consider were adding a Vice President to the board who would serve a three-year term as Vice President, then President, then President Emeritus. The Secretary and Treasurer would serve two-year terms being elected on even years and odd years respectively. Two at-large members would also serve two-year terms. No one would serve more than two consecutive terms. There was discussion on forming a committee to review the entire set of bylaws.
- 2. Attracting, Integrating and Retaining Visitors. Some suggestions were 1) creating a car magnet that would elicit interest and prompt questions around the community 2) expanding the reach of Paul Friedman's excellent articles in the Red Rock News to other publications in the region 3) capitalizing on the richness within our congregation by offering presentations of interest to the community at the library thereby introducing ourselves to a more diverse age group and 4) having more weekend and evening events that would appeal to younger working people.
- 3. Future Ministerial Transition. The group recognized that all good things have a beginning and an end. Some day we will have to look at possible solutions like part-time contract ministers, interim ministers and creating a search team to present potential ministers to the board. Reverend Anthony informed the group that UUA has a Congregation Liaison who would help us when that time comes.

A visioning process was completed which included sharing individual visions, then combining visions and indicating which elements were most important to the total group.

More discussion followed on What's Up in SUUF? Possible enlivening actions to continue, increase, change and initiate things in SUUF were discussed. Three main themes were selected from 7 themes found to be common to both the enlivening actions and the visioning activities. The 3 top themes were prioritized as follows: 1) recruit, integrate, and keep new members 2) develop a new building or shared building plan for the future, and 3) expand our interfaith collaboration and community projects. Potential steps with timelines were created. Further results will be shared with the congregation on November 3rd in the social hall after services.

The retreat adjourned at 3:20 PM

Anthony provided a summary of key discussions from the Leadership Retreat, focusing on:

- 1. Attracting, including, and retaining new members remains a priority for our growth.
- 2. Researching options for our own building or potentially joining forces with another church. This initiative will involve evaluating our space needs moving forward.
- 3. Exploring increased interfaith collaboration on community projects to strengthen our impact locally.

New Initiatives

Steve introduced an exciting new idea: creating a SUUF climate action plan. He shared that the UUA offers a "Green Sanctuary" certification program, which involves completing environmental projects and criteria. Steve, Anthony, and Penny will investigate the program further and will provide more information at the next meeting.

Social Justice Updates

Sarah Anne reported that the Social Justice movie discussion went well, and she and Penny attended the Sedona Sustainability Alliance's quarterly meeting. There, they learned about Sedona's sustainable tourism plan, which aligns with our broader goals of environmental stewardship.

Anthony also shared that the "Talking about Race" class has concluded, with a small but meaningful turnout. The final book club meeting on *Nice Racism* is October 28. Additionally, the next Social Justice movie discussion, *Will and Harper*, will be led by Carolyn next month.

In October, 9 SUUF members helped package fresh pears, plums, tomatoes and power drinks at the Manzanita Outreach in Cottonwood.

During November, the Outreach Team will collect cash or check donations and individually wrapped nutritious snacks and /or drinks for the Sedona Food Bank After School Program. These are distributed to children who benefit from a nutritious snack while they participate in the after-school program. Items can be brought to the synagogue on 11/3, 11/10, and 11/17 and dropped into the labeled box in the lobby prior to services, or dropped off on Penny DeJarnette's porch in VOC. (300 Bell Rock Blvd.) Checks can be made out to the Sedona Food Bank, with "After School Program" on the memo line. Please place any cash or checks in the envelope in the collection box or hand them to one of our team members (Cora, Penny, or Liz). Our total collection will be taken to the Sedona Food Bank by Cora in early December.

November's "Share the Plate" Recipient: The Sedona Community Center

The Sedona Community Center brings nutrition and essential physical and mental activities to seniors in the greater Sedona area. Seniors who are mobile go to the Center to enjoy well-balanced and attractively-plated meals. The lively social interaction that they experience dining together is critical to their mental and emotional well-being. Physical activities such as Qi Gong, Flamenco, T'ai Chi Chuan, and Chair Exercise are offered weekly. Seniors improve their skills in water color and Mahjong classes. A Grief Support Group helps deal with the loss of loved ones through mutual support and understanding.

Perhaps the most essential service that the Sedona Community Center provides is to deliver 90 to 100 meals to the homes of individuals from Monday through Friday. This year the Sedona Community Center is on track to deliver 40,000 meals for the Meals on Wheels Program. The recipients may have physical or cognitive disabilities that keep them at home. They come to rely on the friendly faces of the volunteers who deliver their meals. If on any day, the participant does not respond to the knock on the door or seems unwell, the volunteer reports back to the Executive Director of the Center for follow-up.

The Sedona Community Center is in contact with the relatives of the Meals on Wheels participants who may live outside of Sedona. They speak of the peace of mind that the Sedona Community Center staff and the Meals on Wheels Program bring to the families of their loved one. The program makes it possible for the participants to remain in their homes in spite of physical problems. This month marked the fortieth year that Sedona has participated in the Meals on Wheels Program.

that Sedona Area Homeless Alliance not only meets the general needs of all clients by distributing foods and emergency items but additionally offers transitional programs that address specific needs.

Children's Programs:

- *Project Goodnight* distributes "Good Night" bags to children new to the local homeless community, each canvas bag is stuffed with pillow, blanket, teddy bear, books, headlamp & journal
- Baby Love- Provides clothing, food, diapers, bedding, car seat etc. for children from birth-2,
- School Bell- Provides 3 sets school clothes, shoes, backpack of school needs etc.
- *Celebration* We make sure all children are celebrated on their birthday with a "party in a box"
- *Hush-A-Bye Nursery* Partnership with Flagstaff-based care for infants born addicted to opioids.

Routine Structure Programs:

- *Showers* (on pause $\stackrel{\square}{=}$)
- *Lighten Your Load* Clients are allowed to drop off their packs etc. for the day to go to appointments, work, play etc.
- **Project Move-** Providing donated bikes for transportation- includes helmet & lock
- *Helping hands* Connecting clients with locals for work.

Service Designed Programs:

- *Project Salute-* Provided needed items, services & resources
- Rainbow Streets- LGBTQ+ support services
- My Sister's Keeper- providing personal monthly products to our teen girls, women & transgender clients
- Street Paws- Providing pet food, bowls, leash/collars, spay/neuter, pet toys etc.
- Between a Rock & a Hard Place- supportive "camp site" cleanup
- *Code Blue* Emergency cold night shelter places local homeless in warm hotel rooms when temperatures fall to freezing
- *Project Nightingale-* Places local homeless in rooms during times of medical crisis
- *Health safety support Service* provides over the counter medications, condoms, Covid test, HIV testing, Hep C testing, masks, & more
- *Christmas project* reminding our homeless community that they are Loved with gifts delivered on Christmas Eve
- *Team HEAT homeless emergency action team-* Community volunteers keep basic needed items in their cars to distribute to anyone they feel comfortable approaching.
